#### THUMBS ON THE MARCH: 2023 MUNCIE NATS

Let's start off with the weather report. In all but one aspect the Nats weather this year was delightful. Highs were only in the low to mid-eighties, and only got kind of hot one day. Nighttime temps were a blessing to the campers, staying in the sixties all week and making for deep slumbers. The cool nights did make for heavy dew and fog in the mornings, but it only lasted a few hours. That one aspect! Well, the wind the last two days wasn't our friend, featuring the most turbulent air we'd seen in a while. Thermals were strong and abundant but were kicking out models right and left. The last day's howling winds were added to the crazy turbulence and made for an exciting day. Retrievals that week weren't too bad because of the modest temps and shorter crops, but the winds the last two days made it a chore. The low daytime temps certainly helped. Overall, turnout was about what it was last year in the 130s. (One note of criticism: frankly, the AMA screwed up mightily in not providing the customary large buckets of ice water at HQ to the fliers. Had it not been unseasonably cool, they would've had a big mess on their hands. (Some of the other fliers are so old, and those plastic, pony-size bottles of water just don't cut it.)



Well, I'd say you have your work cut out for you. And as we all say, "SCat Jet, never has an event promised so little and never disappointed", preceding discussion excepted, of course. Other than being worthy of kanones, an ease of construction, costing next to nothing, offering buckets of camaraderie and being a ridiculous amount of fun, it has no redeeming value whatsoever. Plans abound on the interwebs for those thusly seduced by said charms.

## **OUR FREEWHEELING WAYS**

Another chat developed under a canopy during the recent Chattahoochee Challenge about the many ways to get props to freewheel dependably on scale models. Many held forth, including your editor. After a week or so, the WHAM newsletter published the following drawing, outlining all the major mechanisms to do this in clear graphic form. Enjoy.

The only thing I'd add is it's almost always a better idea to utilize the "rotating latch" method by centering the rigmarole on the prop hub, not out on the blade, as shown in the drawings. Two photos from my collection of scale front ends follow to illustrate. Done this way you avoid a serious imbalance issue, and all the doodads can be painted and disguised a little. For most scale models of two feet wingspan or less all you need is a 1/16<sup>th</sup> inch OD aluminum tube for the latch bearing doo-hickey and a short length of 0.025 inch wire for the grabber thingie, bent as illustrated. Why not 1/32<sup>nd</sup> wire? Well, a little slop for clearance avoids a lot of trouble, like dirt, rust, whatever. Also, it's smart to recess the tube into the hub a tad for strength. Avoid grinding into the prop shaft

bearing and fouling the prop shaft hole! This and a wrap of good thread and some glue as pictured really makes the hub/blade juncture more durable, a generally weak area..





## **GOT ANY DOPE?**

No, we're not talking about the whacky-toebacky, rather we're talking about the old, reliable nitro-cellulose lacquer (aka nitrate dope) we use on our model airplanes. Due to the rash of FAC models I completed this year, plus my recent conversion over to tissue-over-Mylar covering for my duration models, I came very near to running out before the Nats, but wasn't really bothered. I'd just get some more, no worries.

Well, it turns nitrate dope and its recommended thinner ain't that easy to find anymore. For example, SIG doesn't even list it on their website. Nor does Brodak, but they do offer butyrate aplenty. I asked around to some of the cottage industry types at the Nats, and they didn't have any for sale, either. After all this and additional searching on the interwebs once I returned home, I was eventually put upon Aircraft Spruce and Specialty in Peachtree City near Falcon Field. Their website shows them to be a solid go-to source for the personal aviation crowd. They sell all kinds of supplies and gear, including righteous Randolph brand nitrate dope, taughtening and non, and thinner. It's lucky I called first before driving down because they were out of the taughtening variety. The nice lady said she could have one quart of both shipped from their store in Illinois that same day. That was Monday morning, and the box was sitting outside my front door Wednesday afternoon. You can't expect better service than that.

Yes, it wasn't cheap, but what is these days? However, I was happy to pay the fifty-odd dollars, American, such was my plight. If you find yourself in similar circumstances, give them a call at 770-478-2310/452 Dividend Dr./Peachtree City, GA 30269/ <a href="mailto:aircraftspruce.com">aircraftspruce.com</a>. They're literally one block away from Falcon Field, and it might be a hoot to check that out. I'd be surprised if there wasn't a cold snack joint somewhere within the field's confines, if you know what I mean, where you can watch airplanes take off and land. Google maps shows a CAF facility of some sort, maybe with some cool, vintage aircraft being worked on.


