THUMBS ON THE MARCH II: WAGONS, HO!

Dohrman, Graham, and Gary traveled to Colorado and attended the Rocky Mountain Champs over Labor Day weekend. Dohrman provides the following report, "In the early parts of the 19th century, thousands of settlers set off on foot and in wagons to cross the Great Plains and settle in the West. It took about 6 months to make the journey, provided you or your animals did not get sick, were injured or suffered from an Indian attack. You could also run out of water and food along the way. There were (and still are) a lot of graves on the way to Oregon or California. Many people simply would not make the journey then, and there are far more people today who would never consider going on such a trek. I would have been gone like a shot. Westward Ho! What an adventure! Even with all the shortcomings, how could you not make the attempt?

"It was in this spirit that three of us here in Atlanta decided to make the Great Crossing to Denver. Graham Selick, Gary Baughman and I decided earlier in the year to make it to the Magnificent Mountain Men's Rocky Mountain Championship. Graham and I rode in his new minivan, which was packed to the roof with modeling supplies and planes for all three of us. My bike hung on the rear bumper. Gary got a cheap ticket and went to Denver on a plane. (He owes us big time.)

"I grew up in the hills of Southeastern Ohio in a tiny village beside the Ohio River. Stand and raise your hands straight up over your head. Now pull them down towards your sides to about a 45 degree angle. Now lower them just a little more. That is the view of the sky I had growing up. Contrast this with the view in Western Missouri and all the way to Denver. It is a very foreign look to someone raised in the hill country with lots of trees! It is certainly different from

the jungles here in Georgia and Florida. If your model goes off the field here, it may land in a place a cat could not get through. Not so in Denver! You keep looking at the horizon and saying, "Wow!" The flying site outside Denver exceeds my wildest dreams for a place to mess around with models. Five miles on a side, the Denver boys set up in the middle and fly whichever way the wind dictates. Perfect.

"They have a very active club of excellent fliers who are remarkably friendly and welcoming to strangers bearing not gifts but model planes. It would be hard to imagine a better group of fliers to have as your pals. We enjoyed this part of the journey the most. Thanks to all for your excellent hospitality! The MMM are a terrific club and great hosts.

"With two drivers, it is fairly easy to make the trip from the South in two days. It's just under 1500 miles each way. This will be surprising to some, but actually, the road trip was very enjoyable. We drove all day at 80-85 mph and averaged right at 20 mpg in Graham's new Kia Sedona minivan. Coming back, I "map-quested" the route to Atlanta, and discovered that Columbia, Missouri was within 6 minutes of being half way. Motels on the road are inexpensive, and can easily be found in the \$50 range. A GPS is invaluable for finding your way back to the hotel in strange territory.

"Accommodations in Denver were set up at an Extended Stay Hotel. Each person had a small suite, and the tariff ended up being about \$40 bucks per night. Some of you reading this may be so cheap you will think that expensive, but it ain't! A number of fliers camped on the field. Personally, I'll take the motel and Rosie's Diner for breakfast. There are lots of places close to the hotel to eat. Altogether, it was a very, very nice setup about 25 minutes from the field.

"If you aren't planning a trip out to Denver to fly, you should. There are a couple of things you should consider that may not occur to you. A chase bike is almost a necessity, as the retrieves can be very long. Put some Stop Leak gunk in the tire tubes as the cactus can get to them. Be sure to stay hydrated and drink more water than you think you should, standard practice here in the South. Wear some kind of leather shoe or boot. The field is thick with grasses that have seeds that stick into your shoes, and go right through a tennis shoe like a spear. They won't make it through leather. We also noticed most of the fliers wore gaiters around their ankles. Once I started pulling the stickers out of my shoes and socks the whole time, it made more sense. Take your cell phone on all retrieves, and also take water.

"Go for it! It is a fantastic site with good people, and you won't regret having gone on your own personal Great Crossing."



PEACH STATE INDOOR RECORD TRIALS

The Great Hall is a great category I site with a ceiling height just three inches below the maximum. The room is drift-free and offers a smooth ceiling with few hazards, and the walls are cushioned. The room also features a long, vaulted ceiling running down the center of the room that offers several more feet in height. This is a good room for setting records, as Bill Gowen has done recently in F1M (world) and A-6. A review of the AMA's indoor records reveals many are over twenty years old. This presents an opportunity for more modern designs and aggressive fliers.

St. Lukes is located in the northern Atlanta suburbs and is very convenient to hotels, restaurants, and shopping, including nearby Perimeter Center mall. The immediate area can be reached directly from the airport via the MARTA train. St. Lukes is on Mt. Vernon Rd. about one mile east of Ashford Dunwoody Rd. Dohrman Crawford has set up a private store on the internet with Café Press to get T-shirts printed with the club logo. David Barfield will send an alternate logo with the Mini Maxer in it to Café Press. Dohrman will put a link on the TTOMA website so members can order the shirts with either logo.

New Business

David Mills discussed the Nats and the weather during Nats week. The heat was pretty bad, but everyone took proper precautions, and the nights were cool enough for good sleeping. There were 227 people registered for the FF events and there were lots of E-36 models being tested. David noted there were lots of E-36 models damaged or destroyed.

David Mills discussed making one of the fall indoor dates a category I record trials event at St. Lukes. The month of November was mentioned as a good date, and David Mills will get some advertisement out in the modeling press to see if there is any interest.

With no more business to conduct, David Mills made a motion to adjourn and Jim Altenbern made a motion to second and the meeting ended at 1:20 pm. Respectfully submitted by Jim Altenbern , vice president.

SEPTEMBER MEETING MINUTES

TTOMA President, David Barfield, called the September 25 meeting to order at 12:55 pm. The meeting was held during the regularly scheduled flying session at the N GA Turf Farm with twelve members present.

Treasurer's Report

Don Brown reported that the club beginning balance on August 12th was \$X,XXX.XX. During the reporting period there was an input of \$90.00 from fees collected at the August 14 outdoor contest. In addition, Jim Jennings joined the club with a prorated half-year membership of \$12.50 for a total addition of \$102.50 during the reporting period ending September 23, 2011, resulting with a closing balance of \$X,XXX.XX. David Mills made a motion to accept the report, and Howard Klemmetsen gave a second. The members voted unanimously to accept.

Secretary's Report

Karl Hube presented the minutes from the August meeting. There were no requests for changes and Howard made a motion to accept the minutes as read. David Barfield seconded the motion and the members voted to accept the report.

Old Business

David Barfield reported that FAC has not yet responded to the request for Kanones to be granted for our MOY Earl Stahl club event. He said he'd stick with it.

Dohrman Crawford asked for new people to make an effort to qualify as Contest Directors as he has carried a major part of the CD load this year and does not want to repeat the process. Jim Altenbern and Karl Hube stated that they would file the required paperwork to qualify so they can help with next year's competitions.

David Mills indicated that a Category I indoor record trials will take place on November 19 at St. Lukes. He said sanction is in hand, and the next newsletter will have a flyer with the details.

New Business

David Mills passed around a collection of Earl Stahl drawings that will qualify for next year's Model of the Year club event. David also reminded everyone that Stahl drawings are available on <theplanpage.com> website, too. David Mills also suggested that the No Cal FAC event be selected as the 2012 Event of the Year. This class was suggested because it's both indoors and because of the high performance that can be achieved with a minimum of material, labor and cost invested. No action was taken on this matter at this time.

Karl Hube opened a brief discussion about our liaison with the owner of the sod farm. Historically, Frank Hodson was our ambassador to the farm, but Frank has not been active in some time. The discussion centered on using holiday cards and restoring the holiday gift item like a food basket to the office staff and owner. No action was taken, but a budget target will be needed by November for this process.

David Barfield asked if anyone thought we should modify our meeting schedule and content. This item came up because of discussion of the highly successful Colorado Magnificent Mountain Men club that has one major business meeting per year. However, they still have informal dinners once a month that keep the communication going. The general consensus was to leave our current meeting schedule alone as it allows the out-of-town members to stay involved on an ongoing basis.

There being no further official business, David Mills made a motion to adjourn, and Howard gave a second. The meeting adjourned at 1:15 pm. Respectfully submitted by Karl Hube, secretary.

MAKING BETTER TRAILING EDGES by Karl Hube

Trying to find good balsa stock to make straight, strong wing and stabilizer trailing edges can be a challenge. For most small models, it is fairly easy to strip a trailing edge blank from a balsa sheet and then plane and sand it to final dimensions. One of the most useful little tools in my shop is the

simple balsa stripper.

However, many times a wide strip cut for a trailing edge has warps in both directions, laterally and vertically. The warp across the vertical (thin) direction is easy to steam out, but the lateral warp is a really tough problem and looks something like:




Fig 2. Lateral Strip Warp




Fig. 3 Trailing Edge Blank

I now have a method that solves this problem. I wish I could claim it as an original approach, but like most of my better ideas, it started with someone else! Tony Cordes in the UK illustrated this method in an Aeromodeller article on A2 design many years ago. As a means of illustrating Tony's work, let me use a Classic Towline wing trailing edge I'm working with now. The wing requires a ¾ inch X 1/8 inch trailing edge. For this, I stripped out six pieces of balsa about 3/16 inch wide from a 1/8 sheet of balsa stock. Then, the whole lot is glued up as shown in Figure 3.

Note that the strips are turned on edge for gluing. The key piece in the setup is the guide strip on the left which must be straight! Generous use of masking tape and an assortment of weights will keep everything in place for a twenty-four hour cure.




Fig. 4 Final Planning To Shape

After the glue has cured, you can start planning and sanding the blank to final shape. Do not forget to sand on both sides of the piece so you do not introduce a spanwise warp in the trailing edge. You will find that the glue joints add little weight, but they do add to the stiffness of the component. For bigger models like power models and towline designs, a tough material is needed for the trailing edges. For my Classic

Towline, I wanted balsa with a density of 12 to 14 lbs/cubic foot to work with. This requires a sheet of 1/8 X 3 X 36 inch balsa weighing between 40 and 50 grams. Most of the balsa I order falls in the 5 to 8 lb/cubic ft range, so I look at the area hobby stores for heavy stock. If you don't have a scale with you, try to find sheets that you can barely dent with your thumbnail and you'll be in the right range. Tony Cordes gave that suggestion and I seem to hit the 12 to 14 range every time! For smaller models like P-30's or for stabilizers, something in the 6 to 8 lb/cubic foot should work.

By the way, this method is also effective for large leading edges or leading edges that have mixed materials like balsa plus spruce or basswood.

Give it a try and see how great the results can be!!
