
THUMBS ON THE MARCH—USIC

This just in from Dohrman Crawford on his trip out west to Eagar, Arizona for the USIC Indoor Nats at the Round Valley Dome:

"Finally back after my 3300-plus mile road trip to the USIC. Yes, it was a long haul, but I rationalize well. It's one day longer than driving to Geneseo, NY. So, three days on the road each way. Forgot to mention my plan was a 9 hr day for two days (Fort Smith, AK, then Santa Rosa, NM), then a 5 hour day on back roads to Eagar, NM. Two Muncie days, then a shorter one, but I had major problems getting out of Ft. Smith, Arkansas due to the flooding and closed roads and bridges. I had to take the back door into rural Oklahoma and then on the way. Cost me a couple of hours, though, which made for a long day. I spent the night in Santa Rosa, NM, then off the interstate and into Eagar. Seldom have I ever been in a nicer, little town. Extremely friendly people, great flying and good to outstanding food made for a pleasant stay.

"The Dome is at approximately 7000 ft. above salt water, which you will discover once you begin carrying your equipment into the flying area. I got over it fast. Although I was basically just a camp body, I had a great time flying FAC events. This Nats was much more fun than the one I attended in Johnson City in 2009. This was probably due to the influx of FAC fliers who kept the levity level up. Bill Slilan, who is from Russia, and now lives in Canada, and I joined forces to loudly sing a Russian song in Russian while David Aronstein flew his Soviet Coconut transport to victory in one event. One of the local kids showed up on his bike to see what was going on, and ended up building a P-24, winning a contest with it, and learning to fly Embryos. FAC members Henry Toews and Rich Adams each gave him an Embryo. He flew them until dark. His whole family showed up, and his Mom made us cookies! A great young man.

"On the whole a great trip. Lessons learned were to get off the interstate and hit the local restaurants. Also, take local roads whenever possible. I stopped to see the Abo Pueblo, the Very Large Array of radio telescopes, and many other scenic stops in NM. I would be up for going on another such adventure."
