THUMBS ON THE MARCH III, INDOOR FREE FLIGHT NATS

It's sad to say that any review of our club's fanfare at the 2016 Rantoul Nats, or anybody else's, will be found wanting. Something happened, and the usual top-notch daily reports via *NatsNews* aren't in evidence this year. Hence, the following brief review will have to suffice. Attendance was up from Moscow and Colorado Springs, but down from the hazy pasts of Johnson City. About 45 indoorists attended and flew. The flying site was generally considered OK, if a little too short in height, and there a great deal of grousing about the heat and humidity, not the buildings fault. The contest organization was widely praised, and no reasonable complaints were heard there in this regard. As anticipated, quite a few fliers took advantage of the proximity of Rantoul to Muncie and made it a double-dipper.

Bill Gowen and the Finns attended. Bill's high point was placing second in Standard Catapult Glider, only a few hundreds of a second behind the winner and ahead of several of the USA's best. Josh did fine in a number of events: setting national records in F1R and autogiro and winning Hand Launch Stick. Such is the limit of the facts at a reader's disposal via *NatsNews* this year.

THUMBS ON THE MARCH IV, OUTDOOR FREE FLIGHT NATS

Quite a few Thumbs attended the recent USOC Nats in Muncie, and a good time was had by all. The weather was one of the best in recent memory, offering mild winds all days except for some windy spells occasionally a few days. Temperatures were hot but not too worrisome, and at night it cooled down nicely, and the campers slept under blankets some nights. It only drizzled a few times during the daytime and didn't affect anything. The highly regarded Hot Dog Man is retired, but he's been replaced by the Hamburger Dudes, a gastronomic upgrade. Some, but thankfully, not as many missteps were evident in *NatsNews* results, namely hiccups here and there, and unfortunately, Friday's results are nowhere to be found. 

A recent issue of *Flying Aces News* has the current Kanone Report, and once again, a number of Thumbs are listed. Air Marshall Dave Niedzielski leads the way with 74. Come and celebrate the end of summer with a mini-contest and good TTOMA fellowship at the North GA Turf Farm. There will be a prize for 1st place in each of three events along with the usual bragging rights. Flying starts at 9:00 AM and ends at 4:00PM with the awarding of awards. Ten dollars and an AMA membership lets you fly all day. Juniors fly free, but must sign up for an AMA membership if they do not have one. Retrieval on the sod surface must be on foot. There is no Porta-Potty on the field (although we've been able to use shop shed facilities on the field in the past).

Special Events:

Embryo

Models will be flown per FAC rules and must be judged for compliance and bonus points by the CD. The models will be flown either ROG or ROT determined before the contest begins. "G" is a plywood runway on the sod, and "T" is a runway on a table. If a fly-off is required, it will be a mass launch at 3:45 PM.

Dime Scale

Models will be flown per FAC rules and must have documentation (plan only) for a compliance check by the CD.

P-30

Models will be flown per AMA rules AMA, which does not have the Builder of the Model rule (BOM). You can build, buy, or borrow the model you fly. Winners will choose a prize from the ones offered in the order determined by the CD. Normally, the weather allows 2-minute maxes. The CD will announce the specific max for the day at the start of the contest, based on conditions.

Club High Point Events:

TTOMA offers year-end high point trophies for club members in a number of categories. Any Free Flight model can be flown using the rules for at least one category. (For example, this year's Month of the Year is the "Comet Phantom Flash". Other categories include scale and SAM Old Timer.) Times turned in will count towards the overall winner at the end of the flying season, and awards will be given out at the annual banquet.
