#### A YOUNG MAN IN THE RECORD BOOKS

Young Caleb Finn made his mark in the record books recently by setting new Junior records in E-36 and A and B Electric. He didn't just ski downhill, either. He posted five maxes and a partial. Let's let Josh tell the full story:

"With the rules change in 2022, making the first fly-off in E-36 go straight to a 5-second motor run, all the records got reset, so this provided an opportunity for Caleb to go after the Junior record with no real pressure. Apparently the Junior records for Electric A and B got reset somewhere along the way, too, so they're all open. We went to the September TTOMA Sunday contests in Whitesburg on a day with decent lift and winds in the 10 mph range. I gave my "Sunstreak" to Caleb to try out since his "Top Banana" is a bit dicey on trim. His first two launches were a bit flat, but the "Sunstreak" is very gentle in its trim, and it pulled away very nicely. The climb is decently fast, usually 80-90 m in 5 seconds, so on a 9-second climb he just had to stay out of bad air. Hope called air for him on all flights, and he was in buoyant air on all but the last flight (fly-off #3). On the 5th flight the model pulled to the left and only got to half its usual altitude for a 5-second motor run. However it was in massive lift and just kept going up, hitting dangerously high altitude by 2 minutes and landing just short of the buildings at the edge of the field. We

disappointing, Caleb was super excited with having made it that far. Since the flight procedure and motor runs/maxes are the same for all three of the found afterwards that the back of the fuselage must have cracked during retrieval from the first fly-off. This was repaired, and the flight pattern returned to normal on the 3rd fly-off, but unfortunately, the air was not what we had thought, and it sank like a rock. While that was aforementioned classes, he got three records out of the deal. Pretty awesome flying, and he has a new favorite airplane. Good thing I built myself a new E-36 this year!"

one and reloaded it into his model, the seconds ticking away. Like before, he occasionally added a few ratchet turns, waiting for signs of lift. Well, guess what happened? His second motor exploded with only seconds to spare. He calmly removed his motor, slowly dropped his model onto the ground and raised his arms to signal a proper sportsman's acknowledgement of fate.

I don't think the other guy maxed. Looking back, it was rather heartening to us other mere mortals. Even the world's best can screw up. There's a big lesson in that somewhere. .
