


THUMBS ON THE MARCH II

The Junkers CL. 1 and its hangar mate the D.1, a single-seat fighter variant, are very historic and forwarding looking aircraft by Junkers and were introduced late in the so-called Great War. - 4. Judged planes and documentation should be brought to the HQ table between 9:00 and 12:00.
 - 5. All fly offs will be a Mass Launch.

AWARDS: Ceremony between 3:30 and 4:00 Sunday. Certificates given for first 3 places. Points awarded to contestants for placing they had in events entered. Prizes awarded based on total points obtained.

Everyone was really pleased to see Frank Perkins return to the field. Most of you know that Frank was injured in a traffic accident in Tuscaloosa early last year. His recovery has been a slow, steady process that kept him off the field through the entire 2018 season. The layoff didn't dampen his skills as he came storming back with max-out performances in both catapult glider and P-30.

The weather was very flyable although the wind picked up earlier than expected and the direction was not helpful. The first P-30 flight of the day showed that a two minute flight was almost off the field, so maxes were reset to 60 seconds for CLG and 90 seconds for all other classes. Three non-DT models were lost including two Blue Ridge Special models and a CLG on a quick "test flight."

LET'S GET READY FOR THE WW I MASS LAUNCH AT THE CHATTAHOOCHEE CHALLENGE

New this year at the Chattahoochee Challenge monoplanes will be able to engage in combat with the biplanes in the WW I Mass Launch. Although this provision has been in the rules for some time it is rarely used. As a result, the monoplanes available for combat are not well documented. Although I am not well versed in this area I have compiled a short list of the monoplanes that flew in combat. Since these were important planes, plans of them should be available on the internet. I'm sure there are others, as monoplanes were produced and tested throughout the war. Unfortunately, many of them were parasols which are not allowed under the current rules. I know there are plans and kits for some of these planes. A quick search on the internet ought to yield some choices. There are probably other monoplanes that are eligible.

Some monoplanes that qualify for FAC WW I Mass Launch

- Fokker Eindecker E. III
- Brandenberg W.29 Sea Monoplane
- Morane-Saulnier Type L and Type N
- Junkers CL I and Dr I (single seat fighter variant)

A Junkers CL I plan

The following plan was created by Ollie Benton who used this plan to build a Junkers CL I that won the FAC WW I mass launch at the 1997 non-Nats. His plane had a 20 in. wingspan. It is a fairly easy build. It was the first all metal airplane. The surface was corrugated. To simulate this, Ollie made an 8.5 x 11 in. sheet of parallel lines 1/8 in. apart on the computer with the lines running the long length of the paper. This was used to print the lines on silver tissue. The insignias were made and put on the usual way. (A jpeg file of this plan is available for those that message me for it-DM.)

If a monoplane does not inspire you how about a biplane?

The fear of building a biplane is almost universal for flyers who have not experienced building them. They are not hard to build if you are careful in picking a plane that has certain features and you use a jig to set the top wing. They fly extremely well. At the recent FAC Nats the WW I event was well publicized for the sportsmanship shown by Wally Farrell. The fourth and final flight had Tom Nallen Jr. and Wally seeing their biplanes each fly over 2 minutes.

I'm going to suggest two biplanes each for a different reason. Both fly very well. The first is the Fokker DVII. If you are afraid of all the rigging in most biplanes the Fokker DVII is for you. This biplane has no rigging, except for the landing gear which is easy to do. There are many plans and kits available, and there is an almost an unlimited amount of color schemes. Make sure that the plan you pick has the bottom wing as a single piece. That way the incidence is set for the bottom wing where it fits into the opening along the bottom of the fuselage. It is then easy to make a jig to set the top angle. Everyone has a different opinion as to what the top wing incidence should be. I would suggest that you set it at the same angle as the bottom wing or a degree or two more than the bottom wing. I do not know which is best. Each combination seems to work, and I'm sure that is why there are so many opinions.

The second biplane is a Bristol Scout D. This probably is the easiest to build, and it is a great flyer. There are several plans floating around. There was a peanut plan from Lee's Hobbies published in a recent *FAC Club News*. Enlarge this plan to 20–21 in. and change the ribs to a flat bottom airfoil for a great flying biplane. If you get *Tailspin* you may already have Mike Nassise's plan of the same plane. I would also enlarge Mike's plan from a 16.4 to 20-21 in. wingspan. If you do not get *Tailspin*, he sells all of the plans that he has produced. There are over 100+ plans covering many of the FAC events flown (Dime Scale, No-Cal, WW II, Embryo, etc.). The list is almost three pages long and can be obtained by writing to him at 22

Greenfield Street, South Easton, MA 02375. The Bristol Scout D on his 2018 price list is \$3.00 which includes postage and handling. Mike prefers snail mail and accepts cash, checks and money orders. If you send a check or money order make it out to Mike Nassise. Many of his plans are great flyers and are easy to build by beginners. This is a great source for planes that can be easily built and flown on the sod farm.
